

AMERICAN LAW FOR FOREIGN LAWYERS, LL.M.

Saint Louis University's one-year master's degree for foreign law graduates provides an introduction to U.S. law. The main feature of SLU's LL.M. (Master of Laws) program for foreign lawyers is its attention to the individual needs of its students. Each LL.M. student is partnered with a faculty member who guides class selection and professional goals. Students also receive intensive academic support services, assistance in locating housing and orientation to the SLU School of Law community.

Students in SLU's LL.M. program have access to top-tier faculty and leading scholars, practitioners and employers.

Curriculum Overview

LL.M. students complete 24 credits of coursework over two semesters, generally in the fall and spring, with the opportunity to continue through the following summer to complete a thesis. Students choose from the full range of courses and seminars offered at SLU School of Law. They may select up to three credits of courses from the University's Chaifetz School of Business (<https://www.slu.edu/business/>), College for Public Health and Social Justice (<https://www.slu.edu/public-health-social-justice/>), or 44 other graduate programs.

Fieldwork and Research Opportunities

Students are required to complete a three-credit course in legal research and writing and a foundation course in a common law subject such as contracts, torts or property. Additionally, LL.M. students produce a written work, such as a seminar paper or a directed research paper. LL.M. students may elect to write an LL.M. thesis for six credits. No more than eight of the 24 credits may consist of an LL.M. thesis, seminars or research papers.

Admission Requirements

Students who have completed a first degree in law from a university or law school outside of the United States that qualifies for bar admission in their home country may apply to this program.

- Two letters of recommendation
- Résumé
- Personal statement

Requirements for International Students

All Saint Louis University admission policies and requirements for domestic students apply to international students. International students applying to SLU must also meet the following additional requirements:

- Demonstrate English language proficiency (<https://catalog.slu.edu/academic-policies/office-admission/undergraduate/english-language-proficiency/>)
- Academic records must include an English translation. Unofficial copies may be accepted in some cases for initial admission review, however official copies must be received prior to enrollment. Course-by-course transcript evaluations are accepted and are required in some cases.

Students must submit financial documents to be issued an I-20 for their F-1 visa application. Proof of financial support must include:

- A letter of financial support from the person(s) or sponsoring agency funding the student's time at Saint Louis University
- A letter from the sponsor's bank verifying that the funds are available and will be so for the duration of the student's study at the University

Application Deadlines

Though applications may be considered until March, it is recommended that students apply by mid-December for the following fall semester.

Review Process

Applications to both LL.M. programs are reviewed on a rolling basis.
