

FAMILY NURSE PRACTITIONER, POST- MASTER'S CERTIFICATE

Family nurse practitioners work in a variety of settings and are also well-suited to rural populations, where specialty care may not always be available. The family nurse practitioner program at Saint Louis University prepares students to provide primary health care to patients of all ages.

Students will help prevent disease, assess and manage acute and chronic health problems, and consult and refer patients within the health care system. This SLU program emphasizes quality relationships with patients, families and communities, as well as education and coordination of services aimed at specific health outcomes.

At the Trudy Busch Valentine School of Nursing, we partner with our students on clinical placement. Besides being paired with faculty mentors with expertise in the students' desired fields of study, Saint Louis University helps students obtain preceptors for their clinical rotations.

SLU's School of Nursing is renowned for excellence in nursing education. U.S. News and World Report consistently ranks our M.S.N.-NP program as a top program in their Best Graduate Schools survey.

Curriculum Overview

Our post-master's nurse practitioner certificate programs are conducted almost completely online, requiring only one visit to the St. Louis campus.

A minimum of 16 credits is required for completion of a post-master's nurse practitioner certificate program. The total number of credits varies, depending on the nurse practitioner specialty certificate pursued. At the school's discretion, students may transfer three to six credits of graduate-level coursework to be applied toward their post-master's certificate program of study.

Student files are individually reviewed. Students may be able to petition for advanced standing in courses such as Advanced Health Assessment, Advanced Pathophysiology and Advanced Pharmacology.

Careers

Upon completing the post-master's nurse practitioner certificate program, you will qualify to take the national certification exam through your specialty certification board.

According to U.S. News & World Report's 2026 Best Jobs ranking, nurse practitioners earned a median salary of \$129,210 in 2023, with the top 25% earning more than \$149,500 and the lowest-paid 25% around \$109,940. NPs once again ranked as the No. 1 job in America for 2026, reflecting strong demand and robust compensation. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that NP employment will grow about 35% from 2024 to 2034, with roughly 128,400 new positions opening over that period – far exceeding the average for all occupations.

Learning Outcomes

6. Coordinates across professions with care team members, clients, families, communities, and other stakeholders to optimize care, enhance the healthcare experience, and strengthen outcomes.

7. Strategically integrates resources to provide safe, quality, and equitable care to diverse populations within complex healthcare systems to address social and structural determinants of health.
8. Implements information processes and technologies to manage and improve the delivery of safe, high-quality and efficient health care services.
9. Models a sustainable professional nursing identity, accountability, perspective, collaborative disposition and ethical principles that reflect nursing's characteristics and values.
10. Engages in activities and self-reflection through Ignatian pedagogy, which fosters personal health, resilience, and well-being while supporting the acquisition of nursing expertise, lifelong learning and the leadership continuum.

Requirements

Admission Requirements

- A master's degree in a nursing specialty, preferably from a program accredited by a nationally recognized accrediting agency
- A college cumulative grade point of 3.0 or higher
- Completion of a graduate-level physiology or pathophysiology course and a beginning health assessment course, or the equivalent
- Experience in an advanced practice role in nursing

The Trudy Busch Valentine School of Nursing adheres to the principles of a holistic admission process in which selection criteria are broad-based and linked to our University's and school's mission and goals. While we do consider academic metrics, we also look at applicant experiences, attributes, potential for success, and how applicants may contribute to the school's learning environment and to the nursing profession.

The curriculum for this program meets the educational requirements for licensure as an Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) in the State of Missouri. Note that the Missouri Board of Nursing may impose additional requirements on candidates prior to granting a license; we encourage you to investigate these requirements.

The School of Nursing has not determined whether the curriculum for this program meets the educational requirements for nursing licensure in any other states or territories. However, graduates of our APRN programs are eligible to sit for National Board Certification Exams in all states and territories. We encourage you to investigate the requirements in your state or territory prior to accepting an offer of admission.

SLU accepts applications to the Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) and Master of Science in Nursing-Nurse Practitioner (MSN-NP) programs from students living in the following states: Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Delaware, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas*, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington**, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

Depending on the state, clinical fees may be required.

Application Requirements

Please follow the three steps outlined below to apply:

- **Step 1: Application**
Submit the application form and pay the associated fee through NursingCAS (<https://nursingcas.org/>). Select Saint Louis University. - **Step 2: Transcripts**
Please submit your official transcripts from all colleges/universities attended directly to NursingCAS (<https://nursingcas.org/>). They will provide details when the application is initiated.
- **Step 3: RN License**
Attach a copy of your unencumbered registered nurse license in the state in which clinical experience will be done within the NursingCAS (<https://nursingcas.org/>) application.

Requirements for International Students

International students on F1 or J1 student visas are not eligible for admission, as these programs are conducted entirely online.

International students on H-1B visas are eligible to apply to the program.

Application Deadlines

Admissions are rolling, with the following deadlines:

- Fall semester start: July 15
- Spring semester start: Dec. 15
- Summer start: April 15
- (Late applications are considered for each admission cycle)
